MOO st of the eminent personalities such Albert Einstein, Rabindranath Tagore, Ramanujan, Shakespeare, John Keats, and Russell – all were gifted individuals in different areas, but they all had some common area of interest and unusual way of doing things. They all had an intense inspiration to achieve the highest perfection in their lives. Giftedness is a broader concept, which signifies excellence not only in a specific field or discipline but also in other related areas. Human excellence as postulated by various theories is not flaccid. Self – actualization emerges as the central concept of all these themes. Fundamental to selfactualization, in all themes, are self-reliance and self-confidence.

Piaget, the most outstanding exponent of cognitive development views giftedness as the innate quality, which is enhanced through a child's experiences. Experiences are those situations, which emerge from the environment. The environment includes both nature and society. Those who are close to their environment get more exposure to nature and more experience from society. The more ameliorate the experiences are, the more is the level of maturity leads to a deeper understanding of life and the world around.

Vygotsky viewed excellence as the highest level of cognitive development. According to him, giftedness is the highest stage of development, which is a continuous process of development of interpersonal and intrapersonal relations. An individual's inherent qualities, his everyday experiences of life, right guidance from members of society help him to direct his thought and action for better cognitive faculties and towards the highest level of excellence.

Carl Rogers, a humanistic psychologist viewed human excellence as a fully functioning personality. He believed that as man lives in society, his personality is bound to be influenced by society. Only a stimulating environment directs him towards self-responsibility, empathy, cooperation, adjustment and maturity, which are synonymous with human excellence.

The concept of Multiple-intelligence coined by the psychologist Gardner opens up a new facet to the concept of human abilities. According to him those who have extraordinary abilities are allied gifted or genius. He considered giftedness as an internalized process, involving inner motivational force, specific abilities and creativeness. He felt that a person can be claimed gifted only if he knows the realms of a common man.

Maslow was also very optimistic about human nature. Maslow believed in the hierarchy of needs: basic needs and higher-order needs which emerge from the interaction between individuals and society. When basic needs get fulfilled one strives for higher needs, which further leads to human excellence.

Swami Vivekananda believed that the man is an infinite source of knowledge and strength. He believed that through concentration the power of knowledge can be acquired, thus leading the
